Moreover, Ferenc gave always interesting papers himself, and I learned a lot from him about Hungarian morphology, for instance on the topic of Hungarian preverbs, such a challenging topic for theoretical morphologists.

Later on I also met Ferenc in the Netherlands. He was an active member of the Comité International Permanente de Linguistique, and this brought him sometimes to my native country. We used this occasion to have dinner together, and to talk about out common research interests.

In short, Ferenc has always been a wonderful colleague. I miss him, but I cherish my good memories of him, and I am convinced that his contributions to linguistics will continue to be of value. Above all, I miss an inspiring model colleague, and I am grateful for what his life and work meant for me.
